**Notes from Speaker**

### **Canadian Alliance Student Associations**

*Executive Director Michael MacDonald and Government and Stakeholder Relations Officer Mathew Rios give a presentation about the Canadian Alliance Student Associations.*

**Smaiya:** Why doesn't CASA engage in more of a grassroots style of lobbying that is proven to be successful? What is the percentage of the total budget is being spent on advocacy?

**MacDonald:** CASA has a staff of five, we budget and have our audited financial statements online. Basically everything that isn't spent on sending students to conferences goes to advocacy. Our rent allows us to advocate, our employee salaries allow us to advocate, etc. Our \$520k budget is almost exclusively allowing our members to advocate. Our members have generally said that they want CASA to be spending their money on advocating on their behalf. I've been involve in student strikes in 2006 and 2012. When it comes to something like Maple Springs in Quebec, in some ways we believe they were extremely effective. However, the following year tuition was raised. I think we can all agree that abolishing tuition is the end goal. While we get there, we need to advocate and decide who gets those dollars first.

**Rios:** We are defined by what our membership wants; we have to be invited by our membership to attend days like today. If you, as a membership would like a more interactive CASA, we are built to change as you want. We feel that you are in the best place to decide how to engage with your students. Our hope is that your Executives bring the information they are hearing from all of you and bringing it to CASA.

**Calder:** Tuition in Ontario is roughly about \$6,000 more expensive than Quebec. Have you made any direct efforts towards the federal government to try and equalize the cost?

**MacDonald:** CASA has always been engaged as to what we want the education to look like. Generally speaking, CASA has been focusing on grants, which is quite successful in Ontario. As far as a generalized framework, Quebec would not participate in that model that but it's something that we will work towards.

**Calder:** You mentioned students whose parents make under the \$50,000 threshold. What about parents who make over that amount but don't contribute financially to their children's education?

**MacDonald:** It's important to make sure that the students who don't need funding aren't getting more than they need. We also need to make sure more money is going into the grant program. The government has created a scale where you don't see the discrepancies. I agree, we need to continue to do more to fix this and it's something that our membership sees as a priority.

**Rios:** It's important that the students are still getting grants, even though they may not be getting a full subsidy. Previously these flaws existed. We are moving a step in the right direction.

**MacDonald:** We need to ensure that all students have a fair chance at education. A free education may not be equal to the quality of education.

**Calder:** Tuition isn't the only expense that students face. Have you ever lobbied for a \$15 dollar minimum wage?

**Rios:** We have been involved in this type of discussion. The main difficulty is the huge discrepancy living costs across the country. The NDP have been extremely vocal on having a living wage. Our membership has talked about it and we have seen the most work at the provincial levels through partner organizations. That's an area we certainly collaborate with on. To your question specifically, no, we have left this to provincial lobby groups.

**Smaiya:** You mentioned that you have previously met with the Prime Minister and will be meeting with him again. What kind of questions do you bring up to him?

**MacDonald:** It can include a variety of different issues as defined by our membership. We are advocating this year on an incentive that involves internal training for jobs within universities. We have had great success so far. Also, CASA has move in the direction to advocate more on mental health, research and innovation, etc. It doesn't matter the party, we need to work with them to solve these student issues.

**Rios:** You may not always agree with a party's opinion but you have to respect them. One of our greatest compliments came from Harper when he agreed to meet with us during his transition out of office. He let us know that he always appreciated our approach to advocacy and the research we provide. We had a decade of a conservative government that didn't always have student issues as top priorities but we continued to see positive changes made. This is because of student leaders like you.

**Hollard:** I checked your financial statements. In 2014, you did not have any capital gains. Can you explain your investments?

**MacDonald:** It should be in the last document in our online statement. The Get Out the Vote campaign took three memberships years of saving to pull off. It was a major expenditure.

**Green:** BUSU is a member of AMICCUS-C, an organization that consists of approximately 65 student unions from across the country including the University of Calgary's student association. I was wondering if you have provided them any support or advice regarding their building being taken away from them by the institution. How have you interacted with them?

**MacDonald:** We have been in regular contact with them. Our board has passed a statement of support, like AMICCUS-C has. We have also offered to do whatever the student union would like us to do to support them. They are currently re-evaluating how they want to move forward, and we will be there with them.

**Rios:** To provide context – the building they have operated in is being paid for by student fees and they have been operating out of it for the past 80+ years. The institution over the past few years has brought a suit against the student union saying the revenue made in the building needs to go back into the university. The services BUSU offers are very much dependent on the revenue made from the businesses you run. You can imagine what would happen if the university took that away. We are very passionate about this.

**Green:** Most unions have rock solid relationships with their institutions but this could cause a domino effect down the road. Have you been working on any "best practices" with your members to ensure all of their agreements with their institutions are in place?

**MacDonald:** Yes, we are providing additional training at our conferences. We will be catering our training and learning opportunities to our members.

**Rios:** We definitely focus on advocacy and media relations. We are working to provide more webinars and online, individual training for those who are interested in learning how to lobby. It's not just lobbying politicians, it's how to properly convey the message you want. If it's an area of interest please let us know and resources should be available online shortly.

**Campbell:** You work with a lot of schools across the country. How do you keep up with diverging interests to ensure all their needs are met?

**MacDonald:** Fundamentally, CASA is a member driven organization. Our members decide on the focuses for the year. We strive to find commonalities amongst our membership at the federal level. It's definitely a challenge, but we tend to find strong consensus amongst the schools.

**Danaher (Calder):** You spoke about youth engagement and the electrical process. Have you pushed for electoral reform?

**MacDonald:** We have engaged actively with Elections Canada, for example, to get polling stations on campuses. We also put out a poll asking students about electrical reform and it didn't come back as a high priority. There are a lot of reform ideas, and currently CASA doesn't have a position but will continue to push for the ability for students to vote.

### **Club Funding Request – Brock Musical Theatre (Budget)**

*President Vatri, Production Manager Powell, VP of Marketing Noctor, and Director Viola give a presentation on the Brock Musical Theatre budget.*

**Vrysen:** There seems to be an addition mistake in the revenue.

**Noctor:** The hoodie sales have been added since our last meeting. It should be \$13,860.

**Hejazi:** Last year I had the opportunity to watch your performance, American Idiot. You have an incredibly bright future ahead of you and an amazing voice. It was my first time watching a performance by BMT and I was astonished by the quality of your work. I can tell that you guys are dedicated and love what you do.

**Hollard:** What do you do with the revenue that you collect?

**Noctor:** We pay all ticket sales back to BUSU. After our first meeting we received an email that said this would be a loan, which has happened in the past.

**Rossetto:** Since most of these expenses have to be paid before the actual show, CPC and BUSAC would usually give them a loan. They will come to us as they need to purchase these items, and we will purchase them for them. As the tickets sales come in, they repay the loan back to BUSU.

**Sufi:** Usually we forgive anything that does not come back to us. But in the past there hasn't been very much to forgive.

**Vatri:** With the way that our ticket sales have been going, it's really cementing the club for a greater production in the future. We are packing our theatres full, and then adding more seats. We are actively making a great deal of money. The numbers do seem scary, but we are returning a great deal as well.

**Nasser:** The \$16927 is a loan but there is \$2000 in there for an emergency contingency. This is probably one of the lower end CPC request that we get.

**Hejazi:** Why didn't you book additional shows or book a larger venue if you were selling shows out last year?

**Noctor:** The reason we didn't book anymore shows is because doing six shows is already stressful enough for university students. Also the reason we didn't go into a larger venue is because although we make as much money, selling out half the seats gives a certain feeling to the show and the cast. The show is always much better when you have a full house.

**Powell:** Also in terms on the theatre, the Blackbox theatre itself gives a more immersive experience for the audience. We found that last year the smaller venue was way better with connecting with the audience.

**Vatri:** I want to cultivate exclusivity with these performances. I want people to be jumping for tickets. They were jumping for tickets last year and they will jump again.

**Powell:** Even with our open mic feature nights on Saturday in the past, our section was packed. We had to remove seats to get everyone in.

### **Club Funding Request – Brock Sport and Business Association (Budget)**

*Co-Founder Kurt Trinder and Chief Financial Officer Maxime Muria-Courchesne give a presentation about the Brock Sport and Business Association budget.*

**Campbell:** Were you aware that you could use the leftover money from the FedUp levy for your events?

**Muria-Courchesne:** I wasn't aware of that. I just thought of Sodexo of the top of my head. I assumed that five to six dollars for appetizers was feasible with relative to how many students come out.

**Trinder:** What is FedUp?

**Campbell:** It is money used for food for student initiatives.

**Muria-Courchesne:** It is a great suggestion because at the end of the day it decreases the expenses on our end. It would ensure that if less students come out then we can cover our costs.

**Green:** There are certain criteria that the event has to go through. I'm not sure if this would fit the Fed Up mandate. It's for providing healthy, diverse, affordable food to students on campus. I'm sure you can reach out to BUSU and we can look into it more.

**Foster:** In 2015 a Brock student named Matthew founded the Canadian Sport Business Network which seems to have a similar mission statement as your club. Have you reached out to them at all?

**Trinder:** Yes, we know Mathew very well. We market with him and other clubs across Canada. I talked with him and he helped us with a couple of different connections and told us how to run this event. He has been a great help to us so far.

**Hejazi:** Thank you for presenting. Can you elaborate on "co-owner" of a club?

**Trinder:** It's supposed to be co-founder.

**Hejazi:** Can you expand on the \$900 on office expenses?

**Muria-Courchesne:** The office expenses include business cards for the team, any promotion material, as well as a website domain.

**Hejazi:** Do you guys have specific numbers? Business cards and websites do not cost that much.

**Muria-Courchesne:** In terms of business cards I budgeted \$200 for the entire team. For our exec meetings, we have about 21 associate to come out. For merchandising I budgeted \$400. The website is only \$200. There is a little bit of discrepancy, I don't remember the last number but most of the office expenses are business cards, website domain, and merchandising.

**Trinder:** This is for the whole year, not included in the ask for the fall semester.

**Muria-Courchesne:** I budgeted half of that for our pitch and what we are asking for from BUSU. The other half can be for next semester or whatever BUSU agrees upon. Most of our expenses are for the food and give aways.

**Stark:** SPMA council put on an event last year and they are putting on an event this year as well. Do you guys feel that you are competing with them in anyway?

**Trinder:** No, we are helping each other. We are working with their co-presidents. They did an event where they brought their students to a Tiger Cats game and did a networking event which brought out approximately 40 students. We are helping them with marketing. We have a big base of students and so do they so we are helping each other. The event that they are doing is a bit different. It's on the weekend with a smaller panel and is only for SPMA students. They usually get 20-30 people. We are trying to cross-promote as well. It looks like we will be getting a higher attendance for our events. So we are working on establishing a relationship.

**Nasser:** Just to clarify, BUSU cannot set aside funds for a carryover for next year since our fiscal year ends April 30<sup>th</sup>. You mentioned you wouldn't be paying for the speakers, but giving gifts instead? Can you clarify?

**Muria-Courchesne:** I put it in there just in case one speaker does require payment. If they are a big name then might as well bring them in.

**Trinder:** That \$500 may not even be needed. We are still reaching out to a few speakers around the U.S. and if they respond late we may need the funding then. The cost of speakers may not even exist and right now it doesn't. The gifts are definitely going to be a cost.

**Nasser:** We are glad that you are very ambitious. CPC, BUSU, and BUSAC are here to support that. Knowing that 20-30 people attend the SPMA events with all the resources that they use to reach out to students; do you think it is a little ambitious to think that you would get 400 people?

**Trinder:** I would say that the 400 is optimistic. We are very determined and think we are going to get 200 people for sure. It is more of a follow up to make sure that everyone knows that the event is taking place. I think it is 100% possible to get the 200 and every extra effort we put into it will help us push it over the top.

**Muria-Courchesne:** Say 100 students come out instead. We still budget six dollars for food per person. It would only be \$600 which takes away \$2000 from our expenses. Most of our expenses are relative to how many students come out.

**Price:** In BUSU we provide money towards the BSA to fund students attending conferences. Why should we give you money to have a fifth option for sports students?

**Trinder:** There is only one option on campus for students. This one is student run, not by an outside governing body. Our speaker panel is much more intense and elaborate. We have better speakers for the students to enjoy. It is kind of a different approach compared to the SPMA event. The SPMA one is for SPMA students only. This one is inclusive to all Brock students. It's just another offering to add value to any student on campus.

**Green:** Is your funding request for tonight just for the fall event or for multiple events?

**Trinder:** Just the fall event.

**Green:** Have you entered into an agreement or contract with Sodexo? Because your costs are six dollars per person, are they going to give you a cut of date to let them know how many people the catering will be for? They are going to need to know ahead of time whether the catering is for 400 or 200 people. Have they given you a deadline?

**Muria-Courchesne:** In my experience with the BSA clubs, I have a deadline a week before the event. Our last tickets sales deadline is four days before the event. But by November 20<sup>rd</sup> we can easily find out an estimate to how many students are coming. Generally, students are last minute in what they do.

**Trinder:** They told us a week

**Green:** Please make sure you hit that deadline.

**Cousins:** Have you put any thought to have a fundraising event to reduce the amount of money you ask from BUSAC? I know fundraisers are easy to do and usually provide a service to the students and the community.

**Trinder:** Fundraising would be another massive event to add to our calendar. We are already tied up with this event that we haven't had any resources to have a fundraiser expect the hockey game which is in next semester. Beyond that we haven't had any fundraising ideas but definitely open to it.

**Muria-Courchesne:** We want to make sure everything we do is successful and make sure we plan it months in advance. We will definitely think of having a fundraiser to our second semester event.

**Stark:** You mentioned that your speakers would be "better" than the ones the SPMA council put together. Can you elaborate on that?

**Trinder:** "Better" wasn't a nice way to put it, sorry. I meant the panel is more diverse. The speakers have different offerings and different levels of the organization from entry level all the way to executive level. I know the offerings that the previous SPMA council has put together and it is impressive. I think our panel is more diverse.

**Nasser:** Have you reached out to Sodexo for pricing at all? The price may be more than six dollars per person.

**Muria-Courchesne:** From my experience for appetizers, it will be \$5-6 per person. Our event is from 7pm -10pm so there isn't anything large scale like dinner. There will only be a small break session where students can get appetizers. I will ensure that we will stay under budget.

**Trinder:** Our plan is to confirm the numbers with Sodexo this week.

**Nasser:** For the Babssocks, what if you don't hit the 200 mark?

**Trinder:** It will just be carried over to the next event.

## Clubs Policy Committee Report

*Brock Musical Theatre*

**Cousins:** Is that the amount what they initially asked for?

**Sufi:** Yes.

**Calder:** Are we voting on both motions?

**Sufi:** No just one at a time.

**Hejazi:** They are asking \$16,927 as a loan. They are bringing in about \$13,000 in revenue and \$2,000 in contingency. This means that there is still an amount that they are not paying back. Should we include that in the statement that the said amount is a grant?

**Sufi:** You don't have to. The way our loan system works is that we give out whatever we decide to any then they pay us back. Whatever they don't pay us by the end of the year, we forgive them. If you like to give them a grant so that they don't have to repay at all, that would be fine.

**Hejazi:** So it doesn't have to be noted?

**Sufi:** It doesn't. The only thing is that for future if there was a large sum of money that wasn't given back to us, we would look very hard at giving them anymore money.

**Green:** Should the motion say, "... be further result, if not returned the loan will be considered as a grant". I think we need to be detailed so that we know the money may not be returned. For transparency sake.

**Sufi:** I have absolutely no problem with that. But it is stated in the bylaws that we can do this, it is the system we work under.

**Green:** I know it is allowed. I just think it should be clarified.

**Sufi:** That would be up to the council to decide.

**Hejazi:** Indicating the grant number would not be a bad idea. Because at least we can refer to that number and compare it to what Brock Musical Theatre gives back.

**Hollard:** It is specifically stated in the bylaw, so why do we have to say it again?

**Calder:** Take into consideration that they never get forgiven, they always make enough to pay us back.

**Sufi:** Also, they may not use the \$2000 for contingency either.

**Green:** Students don't read the bylaws; they read the minutes (and the CPC report is attached to the minutes). This is about transparency for the students.

*Brock Sport Business Association*

**Nasser:** We did not see this budget. We were presented with a different budget.

**Hollard:** What was the rationale of choosing the \$10 per participant?

**Nasser:** In the first request, they had a lower amount for the food and beverages. They also asked for the cost for speakers. If we break down the numbers, it becomes \$5 per person. So we looked at \$5 for food and \$5 for speakers.

**Price:** I think it is a cool initiative, but we already have two other events for Goodman students for sporting events. I'm trying to understand why we should have another event.

**Stark:** We extended the offer to allow Goodman students to attend events. It is difficult to get more than 50 students in an event. I am also struggling to see why we need to spend \$3000.

**Hall:** Do we know if they were even aware of the Sports Management Council?

**Stark:** Yes, we were approached by them last year. They wanted to create their own club. Which is difficult because we are trying to keep it voluntary so the expense is low for all the students. We brought in 40 people at \$20.

**Hollard:** Regarding the funding to the BSA. Currently, our constitution allows any student to opt into the BSA fee which is paid by all business students. For example, if Mr. Price wanted to attend the conference at a discount he could opt into the fee. I believe there is a benefit to having this event and we can judge the success based off attendees.

**Green:** What Mr. Nasser said, is the budget that was just presented to council different from the one that was presented to CPC?

**Calder:** Correct

**Green:** So the recommendation from CPC was based off a different budget. Shouldn't the budget not be the same to both CPC and BUSAC?

**Danaher:** There is talk about similar groups around campus. There are many Christian clubs or other clubs that seem similar but will offer different services to students, just like this club will. They did make this club with intent to reach out to students and provide a service.

**Smaiya:** If there is a lot of discrepancy with the numbers. Maybe if we can go over it the next meeting?

**Sufi:** We can table it until November 16<sup>th</sup>

**Cousins:** If we don't come to a vote today, we will wait until the next meeting?

**Sufi:** Yes

**Vrysen:** I think giving a club only a week's notice about their budget will disrupt them greatly.

**Nasser:** Was something unclear for tabling?

**Cousins:** I just want to table it to see if they can fundraise more

**Banava:** The motion we have to go on is based on the new numbers that were presented. They need to go over it again with CPC

**Calder:** I am not sure if there were any additional speakers and foods.

**Rossetto:** I am sure that the discrepancy was based on the marketing, office expense, and carryover, not their fall event.

**Nasser:** CPC was aware with the budget they presented. With the changes that they made, they weren't drastic. They just want to pay for the food and the speakers. I don't think their budget would change or CPC's recommendation would change. I think this is somewhat time sensitive, and better to get it over it this meeting

**Hollard:** Having worked in clubs and events, if they only know their budget within 10 days, it would be very difficult for them to plan.

**Hejazi:** CPC has been working since August. It is unrealistic to get a budget only a week before the event. It was on their end for coming in a couple months. We need to strategically think about this, we have a hundred clubs.

**Hall:** For a first-time event, I don't think it warrants such a large grant.

**Calder:** Just to clarify, it's up to \$3050 (\$10 per attendee up to 305 attendees). If they get drastically less numbers than expected, then we will only give up to that amount.

**Rossetto:** If you want to vote on CPC's recommendation someone needs to make a motion and we can start discussion on that.

**Hollard:** Would any revenue they make go into clubs funding for next semester?

**Sufi:** Yes

**Hall:** The grant that we are providing, the \$10 per person, would not be coming back to BUSU. I don't understand why we need to have a grant for ticket sales.

**Rossetto:** They have already set their ticket prices. The way it was discussed at CPC was that they would reevaluate their winter event based off of how the fall event goes.

**Hall:** Held similar events before without requiring money from BUSU.

**Nasser:** We are trying to have consistency. We want to help subsidize this event for them

**Hall:** I think the whole event has a lack of planning.

**Stark:** Why are they asking for funding when they already started to sell tickets?

**Nasser:** The issue with having an event in the first semester, time is an issue. There is a waiting list to get to CPC. Clubs who asked for funding on October 1<sup>st</sup>, they may have only spoke to us recently. There might be similar events but this club is opening opportunities to all students at Brock. This is their first event and we will evaluate how it goes afterwards.

**Haidon:** How much thought CPC put into the \$15 after the deadline ticket cost? Did you take into consideration of the revenue from the higher priced tickets?

**Calder:** We wanted to tie our funding to ticket sales.

**Danaher:** I would like to motion to amend to CPC's request as written on the CPC report.

**Hejazi:** The only concerning part of this is that we might have to give them a substantial amount of money. After we get the numbers back for the event, we can have a better understanding. I think that we should give a recommendation to get sponsor.

**Calder:** CPC recommends to every club to fundraise as much as they can

BIRT BUSAC approves \$10 per attendee to the fall forum event to a maximum of 305 attendees (\$3050) as a grant for the Brock Sport and Business Association from Clubs Funding.
